General course description

The purpose of this course is to provide an introduction to graduate-level music research and scholarship. This will include (a) familiarity and knowledge with the music library and other research tools, (b) understanding of standard and diverse reference and research tools, (c) the ability to engage with various aspects of research critically, and (d) preparation for life as a professional musician and within academia.

Small Projects, 25%

There will be small projects throughout the semester that will contribute to your total grade including writing program notes, a Wikipedia edit, and a journal article review.

Large Projects, 35%

There will be a midterm and final project during the semester. The midterm will be open-book. The final project will consist of either an annotated bibliography or a critical edition. The parameters and deadlines for the projects will be relayed throughout the semester.
