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Course Description

An introduction to the teaching of basic violin and viola techniques for violin and viola in the beginner and intermediate levels

Course Pre-Requisites / Co-Requisites Music Major

Course Objectives

1. To develop correct modeling and teaching skills on violin and viola at the beginner and intermediate levels. String majors are encouraged to concentrate on the instrument that is NOT their principal performing instrument. (Violinists will play viola, and violists will play violin.)

2. To successfully perform on the instrument with physical skills at the beginning and intermediate levels.

3 To demonstrate knowledge of techniques for playing violin and viola.

4. To demonstrate knowledge of and skills in methodologies for teaching violin and viola in private lessons and in group settings.

5. To demonstrate knowledge of string method books and other teaching/playing resources.

6. To successfully teach performance skills to other students

Course Schedule

- 1. Attend all class sessions.

5. Pass a performance/teaching proficiency jury on string instrument.

6. Keep a notebook containing handouts, notes on lectures and assigned homework materials. This will be submitted as the final teaching portfolio project.

8. Make two videos that demonstrate fundamental string teaching skills at the beginning and intermediate levels (instructors will provide details in class).

Expectations/Attendance

Students are expected to participate and cooperate fully in establishing an environment appropriate for teaching and learning. Each student is expected to bring the appropriate string instrument and all relevant materials to each class meeting. Coming to class without the assigned instrument will be considered an unexcused absence.
