## SYLLABUS

### Text

Marsters, Nancy. First Year Guitar, 5<sup>th</sup> edition. Tallahassee: Class Guitar Resources, 2015.

Requisite materials include an acoustic guitar with nylon (classical) or steel strings (no solid body electric guitars) and a guitar footstool.

### Course Description and Objectives

This course is an intermediate guitar skills class and is intended for students with prior experience or students who have successfully completed Class Guitar 1 (beginner level) . Emphasis will be on the achievement of basic proficiency in chord playing, note reading, strumming patterns, melody playing and basic finger styles. A variety of musical styles will be explored. Students are encouraged to ask questions during, before, or after class regarding specific playing goals and projects. Students will complete all assigned material and will practice a minimum of 30 minutes per day.

### Attendance

Attendance for any instrument class is imperative.

Students who are absent from class are responsible for materials covered during that class period. Lack of an instrument or textbook after the first day of class will be considered an unexcused absence. Each subsequent unexcused absence will lower the student's final grade by one grade increment (B becomes B-, etc.)

### Evaluation

Proficiencies: 75% total (Exam 1 – 25%, Midterm – 25%, Final Exam – 25%)

Proficiency areas include chords, chord progressions, note reading, song techniques and scales. Proficiency due dates will be announced in class. Proficiencies are performed in class and are graded. The average of the proficiency grades will determine this portion of the student's final

grade. The number of proficiencies is subject to change through the course of the semester. The class will be notified of such changes at least two weeks prior to the end of the semester.

Assignments and class participation: 25% total (see participation rubric attached)

Assignments will be group projects, looking up chord progressions and learning songs, printing materials in preparation for class. Class participation means actually being present in class, attentive, answering questions and showing knowledge of the materials covered in class, asking questions about certain aspects relating to class, and playing along with the rest of the class.
