Course Description: A review of music theory, including part-writing and analysis, in preparation for graduate coursework in music theory. Topics covered include diatonic and chromatic part-writing, analysis, advanced chromatic harmony, and post-tonal theory. The content in this review course will be roughly equivalent to that of a standard two-year undergraduate music theory sequence.

Course Requirements and Procedures:

Students will complete all assigned readings, analyses, and projects on time. Written work will be assigned frequently, typically 1-2 assignments per week, along with occasional larger composition and analysis projects. Exams will consist of written analyses and part-writing.

As the content of the course is cumulative, and the pace is accelerated, it is crucial that students complete all assignments and readings on time. Late work will be accepted with a penalty. Assignments, due dates, and grades will be posted on Canvas, UF's elearning platform: http://elearning.ufl.edu/ (Links to an external site.).

Students are required to watch weekly recorded lectures, read assigned material, and do assigned exercises in advance of class meeting times, which will be used primarily as an

opportunity to work through assignments together and to answer questions about the material.

Attendance: Attendance in class meetings is required unless other arrangements have been made with the instructor. More than three absences will result in the lowering of course grade by one increment for each additional absence.
