Course Description:

An introduction to the principles and techniques of arranging, instrumentation, and orchestration. The course will introduce the standard instruments of the modern orchestra and wind ensemble, discuss choral arranging, and begin a discussion of creative orchestration practice.

Course Goals:

- 1. Students will be able to successfully arrange pre-existing musical works for a variety of ensembles, both vocal and instrumental.
- 2. Students will be able to describe in detail the performing capabilities of vocalists and instruments (orchestral and band).
- 3. Students will be able to write idiomatic musical notation for vocalists and instrumentalists.

Required Course Textbook

Adler, Samuel. *The Study of Orchestration* (4th edition) with access to online textbook audio resources.

Other Required Course Materials

Manuscript paper, computer notation software (Finale or Sibelius are recommended).

Attendance
