General Information

Description

Utilizes draping techniques to create garments. Draping is one of the two methods used to create patterns for theatrical costumes, the other being flat pattern drafting. In this course students will build draping skills through repetition, progressing from basic to intermediate pattern shapes. The course will also instruct students in industry standard like taking measurements and preparing and fitting a muslin mockup. The course culminates with the final project, a dress that is draped, cut, and constructed using a padded dress form based on a model's measurements.

Expectations and Goals

By the end of this course students will be able to understand and put into practice:

- The fundamentals of draping patterns on the dress form
- The fundamentals of truing the muslin drape, adding notches, and accurately transferring pattern pieces to paper
- Taking measurements and padding out a dress form
- Cutting, constructing, and fitting a muslin mockup
- Pattern truing
- Cutting and constructing a final project (dress design approved by the instructor)
- Intermediate construction techniques such as a centered or lapped zipper, facings, set in sleeves, and side seam pockets



- Ironing board




