- Introduction to musics of non-western cultures in comparison with music of Western European civilizations; the nature of music and the realm of ethnomusicology. (H and N).

This course is a survey of global musical traditions with an emphasis on the social, political, and cultural contexts that make each unique. It is also an exploration of how music, as a human phenomenon, may be used to express different ethnic, spiritual, economic, and political viewpoints. To this end, students will develop the vocabulary necessary for critically discussing the fundamental building blocks of music. Prior musical ability or knowledge is not required for this course.



Course Outcomes

In this course, you will learn to:

- Identify different types of music from around the world and the instruments used to perform them.
- Identify some of the cultural and social factors that have contributed to the formation of these musical styles.
- Recognize basic musical and stylistic elements that make each music unique.
- Describe these elements with musically and culturally appropriate terminology.
- Apply this terminology to the basic musical analysis of select musical pieces. in service of basic musical terminology to critically describe and discuss what you hear.

Course Overview

Assignment Overview

- Plan on spending approximately 8 hours per week on the course materials.
- It is the student's responsibility to keep pace with assignments each week.
- Each Module has a textbook reading discussion assignment and a quiz, which correspond to various combinations of readings, listening examples, video examples, and other web resources.
- Learning Modules #3, 6, 9, 12, and 15 each contain a unit test.
- To ensure that everyone in the class stays on schedule, module assignments, tests, and quizzes will close immediately after each week.

In Class Discussions

 Since this is a live course and in-class participation is mandatory students are expected to come to class prepared and ready to participate in large and small group contexts.

Essays

- Essay assignments are located under the "Assignments" tab on the left side of the class website.
- Each essay assignment contains a writing prompt that asks you to reflect upon a number of aspects from the Module material.
- Each Essay will be submitted through Canvas, which uses Turn-It-In to verify originality and authorship, and graded using the rubric provided on Canvas. Students with a Turn It In score of 20% or higher will receive a grade of 0 and will be reported to the Dean of Students without exceptions. Harsh? Yes, it is. UF is a "Research 1" University and takes academic scholarship seriously.

Quizzes

- Quizzes are located under the "Assessments" tab on the left side of the class website. These summarize important points from the Learning Modules.
- Quizzes will be given for Learning Modules 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 13, & 14.
- Quizzes are timed at 30 minutes.

Tests

- Tests will be taken in Learning Modules # 3, 6, 9,12 and 15.
- Students will be given 30 minutes to complete tests and allowed only one attempt for each test.

World Music Concert Report

- Students are required to attend at least one musical performance that falls under the category of
 world music. And before the question comes up, listening to the Krishna group while eating lunch in
 the Plaza of the Americas does not count. They are a wonderful group, but the point here is to stretch
 out and take in a fully programmed performance. UF has some fantastic world music ensembles that
 include the following:
 - o UF Brazilian Music Ensemble (Jacaré Brazil)
 - UF Afropop Ensemble
 - UF West African Ensemble (Agbedidi)
 - UF African Choir (Pazeni Sauti)
 - UF Steel Drum Band
 - UF Jazz Band
 - If you wish to attend a different performance, you must clear this with me beforehand.
- After attending, you will upload a concert report to the Canvas course page before December 9th.
 Reports must be double spaced, 12-point font, and clearly describe the following:
 - The music was performed using appropriate terminology from our textbook.
 - The names of the instruments used.
 - The context in which it was performed (was it a festival atmosphere or an end-of-the-semester concert?).
 - Descriptions of musician performance.
 - Audience reception of the performance.

Work Completion

- It is the student's responsibility to stay engaged with the course material, assignments, and class discussions and submit all work by the assigned due dates. Please note that all due dates reflect Eastern Standard Time (EST).
