# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Directing: An introduction to all aspects of translating a play from script to stage. Building on skill and concepts learned in Play Analysis, students will delve more deeply into script analysis and interpretation from the point of view of the director. Students will work on director's concepts, visual composition, working with actors and will study theories of Directing.

# **OBJECTIVES/GOALS:**

- The student acquires a clear understanding of director's role.
- The student analyzes tools of the director and how to implement these tools.
- The student acquires a clear understanding of composition for the stage.
- The student demonstrates the ability to work effectively with actors.
- The student develops the skills to communicate to designers and production teams.
- The student demonstrates the ability of think critically about concepts and how this relates to the play and the intention of the playwright.
- The student develops the skills and objectives of collaboration.
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- The student recognizes the contributions to the directing process of those whose contributions have been overlooked, appropriated, or marginalized.
- The student participates in a discussion regarding devised theatre.
- The student acquires a critical understanding of the professional world of theatre.

Course Statement: This is an introductory class to directing. It is vital for the student to absorb the basics of directing. This safety net of knowledge will allow the student to move forward in acquiring a more in-depth knowledge and practices for the future.

I am therefore committed to understanding my own beliefs and those of my students as we enter into community with one another. Choose two plays. Three plays provided (handout). Choose two plays that you would like to direct. Direct a scene from each play (two actors) to be directed and presented in class. The second scene directed will be a second play and will incorporate the evolution of knowledge from your first presentation. Dates will be assigned to each director. (Scenes approximately 10 minutes.)

### **Expectations Regarding Behavior/Demeanor**

Criteria by which *performance* work will be assessed:

- Energy and commitment

### Criteria by which written work will be assessed:

- Content (presentation, detail, development, and evidence of course concept knowledge)
- Quality of writing (grammar, spelling, syntax, and punctuation)

#### Criteria by which *participation* will be assessed:

- Frequency of participation
- Quality of comments
- Listening skills
- Behavior

#### **Intimacy Protocol**

For scenes with intimacy that requires vulnerability, intimacy, or violence, please consider these when possible:

- 1. Rehearse in a public location (acting studio, hallway or common room)
- 2. Note your boundaries; if you are uncomfortable with the scene or the manner in which the scene is being rehearsed, discuss it with your scene partner and instructor.

3. You are not required to kiss or be in close bodily contact. Discuss with your instructor and scene partner other options.

## ADDITIONAL CRITICAL INFORMATION

**Attendance Policy:** 

ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY

Your learning comes in the shared experience. Your participation has as much to do with others' growth as your own. Your absence is costly to everyone. Students are expected to be in attendance and to be on time. Students are allowed 1 "unexcused" absence that does not require documentation and does not conform to the UF "acceptable reasons for absence." Any other "unexcused" absence will result in a penalty of a full letter grade (10%) from the final grade per "unexcused" absence. To be considered "excused" an absence must be accompanied by appropriate official documentation. Religious observances do not require documentation.

Any absence from class for the following reasons must be supported by official, acceptable documentation to avoid a grade penalty:

Illness -doctor's note must be on official letterhead with address and phone number, noting the date and time of visit and diagnosis verifying that an absence from class is warranted, doctor name and signature

**Serious family emergencies** 

Special curricular requirements (e.g., judging trips, field trips, professional conferences)

Military obligation

Severe weather conditions (e.g., hurricane-related events)

Participation in official university activities such as music performances, athletic competition or debate

Court-imposed, legal obligations (jury duty or subpoena)

To help organize accommodations, students should inform the instructor by the end of the second week of classes of religious observances of their faith that will conflict with class attendance this semester.

Any student that acquires 3 absences (either excused or unexcused) will be required to meet with this course's instructor and/or area faculty to discuss the student's continued participation in the course.

Failure to attend this meeting will result in Artistic Probation.

Due to the participatory nature of the course that includes in-class collaboration along with partner and ensemble work, if a student acquires more than 2 unexcused absences, the student may be prohibited from participation in partner/group exercises which will affect the student's final grade.

In the same way, tardiness will also be penalized.

Each additional late arrival will result in a 5% deduction from your final score.

Excused absences do not make one exempt from class obligations. Work must be made up in a timely fashion, at the discretion of the instructor, typically in the week following the student's return to class. Unexcused late work will be penalized with penalties increasing relative to lateness; anything past deadline is at least 1 day late.
