TPA3208: Drawing / Drafting for the Stage (ONLINE) University of Florida School of Theatre + Dance FALL 2022 : M/W 12:50pm-2:45pm

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Course Description:

This course introduces students to translating design ideas from sketches and technical drawings, to computer drawing applications - specifically AutoCAD.

Course Goal:

Drafting is the ability to translate three dimensional ideas into two dimensional information in reproducible form well. The goal is to leave the class with a solid understanding of drafting for the theatre in digital format. This class prepares you for a career in the arts.

Course Philosophy:

Drafting is a tool which allows a designer or technician to visualize their creative impulses. Clear and clean drafting based on those visions, communicates enough information for correct realization on the stage. Drafting skills include learning to accurately draw designed scenery in scale/proportion. By the end of the course, you should have mastered the conventions and fundamentals of the language of theatrical drafting. Proficiency in drafting is a matter of extensive practice with patience. It will seem challenging at first, but once you understand how to approach drafting, it will get easier and you will get faster. It is important to remember however, that drafting is always a tool with a purpose. As designers, you should aim for clear and accurately drawn components so that other members of a production team can bring your ideas to life.

AutoCAD has become the industry standard for many set designers and nearly all technical directors. Computer aided drafting allows users to create drawings that are easily altered, replicated, and distributed, but it does not necessarily replace hand drafting in the creative process. Often, many designers still start with traditional methods. Even though both AutoCAD and hand drafting can be used to create drawings with the same degree of completeness, we will be focusing on completing projects on AutoCAD. You will leave the class with another tool to add to your kit by gaining experience working effectively in a forum of open discussion and exploration.

Note: While Vectorworks has become the go-to software for lighting designers, the main goal of any designer is the same. Regardless of the computer program, you will need to find a clear and clean way of drawing things correctly. Lighting designers will still benefit from learning how to properly draft by composing scenic layouts.

Through this course you will:

- 1. Learn about theatrical drafting standards, and USITT guidelines for drafting packages.
- 2. Receive training in drafting specific components such as doors, windows, and stairs.
- 3. Gain basic to intermediate knowledge of AutoCAD including:
 - · Working with program preferences, options, & settings
 - · Using many of the drawing control tools and modification tools
 - Drafting orthographically aligned objects using layers, line-weights, and line-types
 - Creating layout pages with dimensions, notes, labels, and multi-leaders
 - Distributing a full set of finished theatrical drawings (.zip & .pdf files)

4. Be introduced to external applications that may be used professionally in tandem with CAD

* A course calendar will be provided after consultation with the students during the first class. This course is crafted around the needs of the currently registered students and their level of knowledge/experience.

The required applications for this course are available in the current catalog of UF APPS. All programs are offered for both PC and Mac operating systems, though demos will be done in class on the Mac versions.

- Your work should be open and ready to screen-share for group critique sessions and instructor feedback. In-class workdays are meant for one-on-one feedback; come prepared and ready to ask questions.

Assignment Policy:

All assignments are to be ready for discussion & critique at the beginning of the class period for which they have been assigned, or they will be considered late. Late assignments may be accepted late with an extension at instructor discretion. If an assignment is not submitted by the revised deadline, it will be given a zero. Projects are designed and graded on a point system. The greater the amount of points, the more percentage of your overall grade.

Submitting work:

Projects are due to the appropriate CANVAS submission folder by the start time of class on the specified due date. Files must be saved in AutoCAD DWG format with the following filename:

If there are any changes to this format, they will be noted on the assignment sheet for that project. All assignments must be uploaded to CANVAS. I do not accept emailed files.

Grading:

Course assessment is based on accumulated points earned for assignments and participation. Each project will have its own grading rubric. In general, projects will be graded on: drawing management, layer management, layout, line-weight, line-type, notation, accuracy of the orthographic/section views and the level of detail incorporated. Points earned for assignments will be combined with the total amount of points earned for attendance and participation to determine your final grade.

One important aspect of acquiring a skill is discipline. It is essential to do your assignments and do them on time. Professional designers adhere to deadlines, and this class should help you shape your time management skills. Do your best to keep up.

Academic fraud and/or plagiarism is not acceptable and will result, at a minimum, in a zero credit for that assignment. Students are encouraged to help one another if a problem arises but you are expected to do your own work.
