Course Description

Second sequence of four courses that develop skills in sight singing and ear training. Skills will include listening and identifying scales, intervals, chords, as well as reading simple tonal melodies at sight.

Objectives

- To develop and reinforce skills such as dictation, sight singing, rhythmic sight reading, meter, and notational practice.
- An understanding of the common elements and organizational patterns of music and their interaction, the ability to employ this understanding in aural, verbal, and visual analyses, and the ability to take aural dictation.

Exams

Dictation Exams: Two dictation exams will be given over the course of the semester. These exams will be taking home in nature and be submitted online via Canvas. Students should be able to aurally understand and clearly notate musical ideas. Specifics on these will be covered in the days/weeks prior to the exam date.

Sight Singing Exams: Two sight-singing exams will be administered during the course of the semester. These will be given one on one. A meeting prior to these exams, students will sign up for a time to meet with the professor for 5 minute slots to take the sight singing exams. Students will not be graded on the quality of their voice but rather the accuracy of the notes and rhythms.

Rhythm Reading Exams: Similar to Sight Singing Exams, except will only focus on rhythms.

Weekly Assignments

Students will be expected to submit weekly dictation, sight singing, and rhythm reading assignments as added practice for exams. While there is no late penalty for these assignments, feedback may not be as timely for late submissions.

Attendance

Because Aural Skills is "hands-on," students are expected to attend and be engaged in every class in some way (preferably synchronously when possible, though recordings will be made available for asynchronous viewing as soon as possible). Attendance will not be graded as engaging in class is to your benefit – the more practice you get, the better your performance will be on dictation and sight reading exams. Students will not be required to turn on their cameras but are expected to act professionally.

<u>Dictation Units (found in Ear Training: A Technique for Listening textbook):</u>

Unit 1: Melody 5A, 5B, 6A, 6B; Harmony 3A, 3C, 3D, 4A, 4D, 4E, 5A, 5D; Rhythm 4A, 5A, 5B, 6A; Review of all intervals ascending (m2-P8); All melodic intervals descending (m2-P8)

Unit 2: Melody 7A, 7B, 8B; Harmony 6A, 6D, 7A, 7D, 8A, 8D, 10A; Rhythm 7A, 7B, 8A, 8B, 9A

Sight Singing Units:

Unit 1: Melodies with skips in diatonic triads, compound meter

Unit 2: New meters, melodies with skips of all diatonic intervals

Rhythmic Sight Reading Units:

Unit 1: More advanced rhythms in simple and compound meters, including triplets, meters where the half note gets the beat

Unit 2: Asymmetrical Meters, advanced rhythms in a variety of meters
