Course Description

Woodwind pedagogy for clarinet is a one semester seminar course for clarinet performance majors to study the art of teaching. The course will focus on pedagogical concepts, history, and an exploration and examination of significant study materials for clarinet.

Course Outline

The student(s) will meet with the professor on a regular basis to establish a list of materials to be studied, specific reading assignments, and the project(s) to be undertaken. A final take home examination will be given.

Course Goals

Instructional goals for the course include achieving a solid foundation in basic pedagogical concepts and instructional methodology, completion of an historical examination of clarinet pedagogy, and the development of a working knowledge of the standard educational materials for clarinet from the early eighteenth century through the present day. Student goals will include the successful undertaking and completion of a major project. The project will focus on pedagogical concepts and works of historical significance, with analyses and commentary regarding methodology and philosophy. The project could also include the evaluation of live and recorded lessons, masterclasses, and performances.

Topics

Main topics will include research on important educators, and the examination and evaluation of important educational materials which include the clarinet. Texts to be

studied will include pedagogical literature, method books, etudes and studies, and other milestone educational materials. Particular emphasis will be to research and study the pedagogical literature not covered in depth in Clarinet Studio.

Instructor's Educational Philosophy

As a teacher, it is my responsibility to offer each student the opportunity to learn and progress in an environment conducive to learning. It is my desire to impart in each student the ambition to achieve academic excellence. Grading Procedure

Grading will be based on the course content learned as evidenced in the quality of the assigned projects and final examination. Assigned projects will be worth 50% of the total grade and the final examination will be worth 50% of the grade.

Extra credit can be earned with approval from the instructor. Eligibility for extra credit projects will be decided by the instructor, based on the observance of a high level of effort and dedication throughout the course. If deemed eligible, students can be awarded extra credit for special projects undertaken as well as performance activities and/or research that relate directly to the course. It is the responsibility of the student to request an extra credit project from the instructor, prior to the 14th week of the semester.

Final Examination Procedures

The final examination will be a take home test consisting of essay questions relating to the research undertaken during the course.

Attendance/Tardiness

Attendance will be taken at all class meetings. Students are required to attend all scheduled classes. Unexcused absences will result in a one grade deduction.
