## Course Description

Jazz Composition and Arranging provides graduate instruction in jazz composition and arranging and advanced techniques for commercial song writing. Students will study chord movement, melodic development and composition techniques for various styles of music. Students will complete original compositions and arrangements, contra-facts, sax solis, big band chart and know the basics of string writing. A passing grade of B or better in this course is required for the Master Degree.

**Portfolio requirement:** Student will complete a large group recording project.

## Course Objectives/Goals

This course is vital to ensure that our jazz graduates have the opportunity to learn jazz composition and arranging skills that will enable them to be competitive in the commercial music industry. This course covers the writing styles of jazz, smooth jazz, rock, pop, latin, salsa, and dixieland. The instruction received in Jazz Composition and Arranging will contribute to the financial success and diversity for students who complete this course.

## Representative Text and/or Materials:

**Inside the Score (Author: Rayburn Wright) (\$50)**

ISBN: 9991739661

Ray Wright has thoroughly analyzed eight classic charts from the pens of Thad Jones, Sammy Nestico and Bob Brookmeyer. The complete full score for each part is presented and the following elements are isolated and discussed: voicings, orchestration, textures, melodic construction, climaxes, chords, etc. The benefit of this book is that you can actually SEE real charts, and then listen to the CD to learn how the written notes translate into REAL music.

- A recording device (or access to a computer-based recording program)

<p><b>Project Four: Write an Original Big Band Composition</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Score for the same ensemble as Project I (External form: ABA)</li> </ul> <p>A: Intro, head, ending with climax then with transition to next part.            B: Middle section: develop materials found in "A", and end with the full band scored to climax. There should be an extension to the form at this point.</p>	<b>600 points</b>	

<p>B section can consist of one or more of the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Solo with bkgds (bgs 2Xo for opt. repeat, bkdgs building to climax)</li> <li>2. Soli (1/2 chorus saxes or tbns, followed or preceded by solo or tutte)</li> <li>3. Tutte section (1/2 chorus, preceded by solo or soli).</li> <li>4. Recapitulation.
