Catalog Description | Ceramic Design

Investigates the intermediate level of technical, aesthetic, and conceptual issues in ceramics. Study the formulation of clay and preparation of glaze materials with an emphasis on personalized expression through the ceramic design process.

Prerequisite: <u>ART 2752C</u> and must be (BFA Art or BA Art or BFA Graphic Design major) and must have passed sophomore portfolio review.

Course Overview |

This course investigates aesthetic, conceptual, and technical issues in contemporary ceramic design. There is an emphasis on innovative design solutions for objects interacting with the body, tableware, and architecture among other forms. Through the study of contemporary and historical ceramics we will discuss aesthetics, function, ritual and design thinking to develop a critical perspective of what a ceramic design object can be and do in today's society. Demonstrated intermediate techniques will include slab, extrusion, mold making, wheel throwing, jiggering, CAD modeling, 3D printing, and ceramic decals. The class format will include discussion of relevant readings and artists, demonstrations of techniques, ideation exercises, critique, labs on mixing ceramic materials, electric and gas kiln firing procedures. Class discussions and critique will follow a variety of formats focused on facilitating generative, critical, and articulate dialogue.

Learning Objectives | Upon completion of this course students should be able to demonstrate:

- Control and understanding of clay forming, drying, firing, and finishing
- Intermediate proficiency in hollow forming techniques; slab, extrusion, wheel,
- Intermediate proficiency making and using multi part plaster molds
- Basic proficiency in CAD modeling for object design and 3D printing
- Basic proficiency mixing and testing glaze materials + application
- Proficiency in kiln loading and firing procedures for bisque, glaze, and decals
- Understanding of gas kiln loading and firing for reduction and atmospheric firing
- Increased visual awareness & verbal articulation related to ceramic design
- A critical approach to project research, ideation, production, and reflection
- Competency in proper health & safety procedures in a ceramic studio
- Exposure to artwork and theory related to ceramic design

Student Expectations |

- -Come to class on time, ready to work, with the necessary supplies and completed course work.

Discussion Boards

Discussions responding to reading or suggested artists are assigned for each project. Discussions will begin a-synchronously on Canvas and require you to respond to the discussion prompt and to a peer's post. A summary discussion will occur in class following every discussion deadline

Project 1 – OBJect Shop

For this project you will be grouped into small design collectives. As a collective you will develop a product line of 100 discrete functional objects using various techniques. Following a greenware critique, you will edit down to approximately 40 objects for firing and glazing. As a class we will then develop a display strategy for the best finished objects to go in a popup shop at UF. Forming techniques will be analog and digital including the hand, hand tools, templates, forms, and 3D printing

Readings will be provided on Canvas

Project 2 – FUNCtion

Focused on expanding your concept of function through divergent and speculative design to create a set of objects with various functions to fulfill a specific need. We will start with the study of tableware and expand the designed sets beyond the cup, mug, bowl, and plate. Design strategies and forming techniques will be analog and digital including throwing, jiggering, and extruding.

Readings will be provided on Canvas

Project 3 – Body Architecture

Develop an object of moderate scale when assembled that interacts with the body. Example objects include pillows, chairs, stools, end tables, lamps, speakers, toilets, architectural components, etc. Design strategies and forming techniques will be analog and digital including plaster molds, slip casting, press molding, decals, and various hardware strategies.

Readings will be provided on Canvas

Material Testing

There will be reading, lecture, and assignment requirements dedicated to glaze and clay chemistry, formulation, and testing

Quizzes

There will be quizzes in various formats throughout the semester to ensure that you are keeping up with technical information, conceptual ideas, and assigned readings

Sketchbooks |

An **ongoing assignment** is to **keep a sketchbook** for each project. This should include notes from lectures and demonstrations, assigned ideation exercises, in addition to your thoughts, drawings, and reflections for each project. Your sketchbook can be in any format that compliments your practice. It is required that it is available to review every class period and that it can be submitted as a compiled PDF.

Homework |

Homework in this class should be considered ongoing. I expect you to be putting in the appropriate amount of time outside of class to complete readings, develop ideas in your sketchbook, and complete projects in the studio. We will discuss and walk-through assignments as a class so you will have time to ask questions to avoid misguided efforts. Also, along with each project, artists, readings, and videos will reviewed and posted on Canvas for your reference. Please note that deadlines are NOT negotiable. Late work NOT accepted unless discussed with instructor prior to deadline.

Project Expectations | Preparedness and Discipline

A <u>minimum</u> of 6 hours of studio time per week, outside of class, is expected and necessary to complete projects in the allotted time frame. Successful completion of the projects includes preparation (reading, research, ideation, drawing, etc.), fulfillment of assignment criteria, presentation of work on assigned date and participation in group critiques. Please complete all readings and discussion posts by the assigned date and be prepared to discuss the material the following class. Finished work must be installed and presented in a professional manner on the assigned critique day. Installation and any necessary repairs/touch ups must be completed before the start of class.

Clay and Glaze Materials |

You will use stoneware for this class. Budget to use a minimum of 4 bags of clay in this course. Clay is \$18 per 25 lb. bag or \$10 per 25lb. bag of reclaim.

Please note that reclaim is less consistent than clays from manufacturer Clay can be purchased through me during class time, through Derek during posted hours outside of our class time, or through the SA+AH Office at posted signs only with a <u>CHECK OR MONEY</u> <u>ORDER</u>. There is a form to fill out and bring with you (it's near Derek's office). Once paid, bring the receipt to me or to an available grad student for the clay.

Glaze materials including, slips, wax resist, stains, patinas and pyrometric cones are covered by the course materials fee. The plaster, decals and special materials are sold separately and can be purchased by weight or quantity with the same form as for clay.

I will collect first clay receipts at the start of our second class meeting.

Additional clay will be available during class and can be purchased from our Teaching Lab Specialist, Derek Reeverts during scheduled hours posted on his office door as well as available grad students. Please arrange to pick up your clay during these hours. It is suggested that you keep any additional clay locked in your locker and that you recycle your used clay for future use (after training).

Not having clay to work with when needed will result in an absence. We cannot accept IOU's.
