PURPOSES AND GOALS

This course will trace the historical development of hymns in liturgical use, the scope of hymnic literature, and the major trends in hymnal compilation and editing. Course topics will include a survey of Western hymnody from its Latin roots to the contemporary American hymn. In addition, the course will compare/contrast major denominational hymnals.

PRESENTATION

Each student will be required to give an in-class presentation of no more than fifteen (15) minutes. The presentation may cover any topic relevant to the course. Topics might include an in-depth analysis of the hymns of a particular composer, the texts of a representative poet, a major trend in hymnody, etc. You may want to include power point, recordings, live performance, handouts, etc.

HYMNAL ANALYSIS

Each student will provide a written analysis of their chosen hymnal. The analysis should include an historical survey of poetic texts and hymn tunes. The analysis will most likely be in an outline format. During the final exam period each student will share their findings with colleagues.

HYMN FESTIVAL

The class will develop and present a 50-minute hymn festival for the public. Date/venue will be decided by the end of January. The class shall decide on a theme for the festival (general survey, topical, etc.) and find appropriate readings and supportive materials. Class participants will contribute to the event as song leaders, accompanists, and/or readers. (If interested, those available might present the hymn festival a second time during the Sacred Music Workshop held on May 6-7, 2024.)
