Course Description/Purpose:

TPA 4931, Advanced Stage Management Seminar, is a repeatable course for undergraduate School of Theatre and Dance students that is part seminar and advanced topics. The seminar portion serves as a forum for peer sharing and problem solving on current production assignments. Rotating topics are specific to the stage management profession and industry trends.

Course Objectives and Student Outcomes:

Seminar Portion:

- To discuss and reflect on School of Theatre and Dance production assignments through weekly class discussions.
- By the end of this course students will:
 - o Continue to develop their individual stage management style.
 - O Develop skills as a discussion facilitator.
 - Have the ability to generate meaningful questions to promote productive dialogue and peer exchange.
 - O Advance their own and their peers' level of problem solving from the perspective of a stage management team member.

Advanced Topic Portion:

- To be determined in collaboration with students during the initial class meeting.
- Previous advanced topics focused on inclusion, diversity, equity, and accessibility; theatrical unions; self-marketing, cover letters, resumes, and job interviews; networking; stage management technology; goal setting; book reading/discussion.

- Exercise confidentiality as production assignment challenges and opportunities are explored.

Content Advisory:

In this course, we may discuss content and materials that some may find difficult. It is important in a stage management course that we do not shy away from engaging with materials that may be controversial or challenging. We will do our best to give advance notice when specific materials or content covered may contain images, language, or perspectives that some may find difficult. We ask students to do the same when facilitating course discussions. I encourage you to reach out to us if you are struggling with course materials. In class, if you need to step away for a period of time as we are covering particular content, you may do so without course attendance penalty.

Course materials and discussions are not intended to espouse, promote, advance, inculcate, or compel specific viewpoints. Students should engage in critical thinking and rely on verifiable data and sources to interrogate reading assignments and topics discussed in this course to form their individual perspectives.

The success of this course is based on discussion and class participation. Attendance is vital. Your first unexcused absence from class will be permitted without penalty. The second unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 5%. The third unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 15%. The fourth unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 30%. 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Course Assignments:

• SoTD Production Assignment Reflection/Discussion

(Role as facilitator and discussion participant assessed)

- O Students are assigned to facilitate discussions based on their current SoTD Production Assignments. The goal of the discussions is to explore challenges, best practices, and foster solution-oriented dialogue with peers. Productions in rehearsal and performance will be prioritized for longer discussion. Students may provide additional information to support discussion from other sources. Examples may include a recently published article, media reference, etc.
- O In preparation for the weekly discussions, student facilitators will post topics and related questions for the class to consider to the course Canvas site (no later than the Thursday prior to each class discussion at 5pm).
- O Student facilitators are defined as stage manager or deck stage manager assigned to an SoTD production in prep, rehearsal, or performance.
- o All students are assigned to prepare to address questions posed by facilitators.
