COURSE DESCRIPTION

Individual instruction in the craft and art of contemporary music composition through guided exercises, score study, discussions, and composition projects.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Students will complete all assigned readings, analyses, and compositions on time, and attend every weekly scheduled meeting with the instructor. Students will compose a minimum of eight minutes of music per semester, and make every effort to have their compositions performed in public. A listening journal of no less than 32 pieces, including suggestions and assignments from the instructor, will be presented at the end of the semester. Students will present a portfolio of their work for the full composition faculty at composition juries at the end of the semester. All students studying composition are required to attend the weekly composition forum, Fridays at 12:50pm in MUB 144.

ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance is required. Missing more than two lessons will result in the lowering of the grade by one full letter. Students are asked to contact the instructor with no less than 24 hours notice of any anticipated absence in order to reschedule.
