Location: Classes will primarily meet in person or on other platforms.

Course Description: Opera Workshop develops a student's performance and related professional skills specific to the creation of musical dramas. Repertoire will primarily include musical and character development rehearsals for the Fall Opera Scenes production.

Course Goals:

- 1. To study musical drama as a performer.
- 2. To develop professional rehearsal skills, etiquette, and the ability to work well within a group.
- 3. To improve the students' stage confidence and movement.
- 4. To develop the individual's ability to analyze characters, music, and libretti.
- 5. To develop an overall understanding of opera repertoire.

Required Materials:

- 1. Musical Scores, provided
- 2. Computer with Audio and Video (Zoom) applications
- 3. Rehearsal Staging Attire: Rehearsal skirts, shoes, long pants, etc,
- 4. Audio Recorder at coachings and musical rehearsals

Assignments:

- -There will be weekly reading assignments from Malcolm Arnold's book *The Complete Singer-Actor Manual*. The book and reading schedule will be posted on Canvas.
- -There is a Character Development Assignment due October 6th.
- -There is an Artistic Resume Assignment with the 1st draft due September 18th.

Final Exam:

The Opera Theatre Workshop is performance-based course. Students will be graded on their final public performance(s) and/or performance video creation.

- -Rehearsals are safe places to experiment, make bold choices, and create expressive theatre with your colleagues. Images or video recordings of these rehearsals being archived or posted on social media is counterproductive and not allowed.
- Once the piece is ready for public performance, pictures and video will be allowed but ONLY with the permission of everyone in the scene.
- *Some scenes will be recorded as a teaching tool but only shown in class.
