Course Description:

This course introduces African art by highlighting its diversity and complexity. It examines historical and methodological questions to contextualize works of art from across the continent ranging from as early as Ancient Egypt to the golden Middle Ages of Timbuktu, from masquerade societies and performances to colonial-era art schools, from portrait photography and reportage to biennials and the Afrofuturism of contemporary artists such as Wangechi Mutu. The course proceeds chronologically and regionally, emphasizing themes of continuity and change across the continent.

Course Objectives:

- Familiarity with foundational methodology of African art history through class readings, discussion, and writing assignments.
- Attribute major artistic traditions to geographical regions of Africa through quiz and class lectures.
- Expand skills to interpret African art objects from diverse cultural backgrounds and functions by class discussion, and readings.
- Develop oral presentation and research skills by delivering a presentation on an art object.
 Expand visual literacy by class activities and discussion centered on formal analysis.

Required Textbook:

Suzanne Preston Blier, *The History of African Art*. Thames & Hudson, 2023. You will need to acquire this book; it is affordable and highly useful. The textbook will be placed on Reserve in the art library, along with several other books pertinent to the study of African art. Other required readings will be posted on Canvas.

Completion of all assignments and exams is necessary to pass the course. Any grade of C- or below will not count toward general education or major requirements.

Attendance, Participation, Due Dates:

Students are expected to attend all classes. Attendance will be taken at the start of class. Students are permitted only **three (3) unexcused absences**. Except in extenuating circumstances, more than three unexcused absences will affect your final course grade. The instructor may opt to **drop your final grade a half-step for every additional unexcused absence** (B to B-, B- to C, etc.). Absences that are incurred as a consequence of illness, religious observance, or family emergency will be excused with an official doctor's note or written statement, although supplemental assignments may be assigned in order to help keep up with the material and to make up for lost class participation. **Unexcused late arrivals and early departures of 15 minutes or more will count as an absence.**

Active participation is required for this course and will be factored into your final grade. Active participation means being engaged during lecture, coming to section having completed all the readings and being ready to discuss them (consulting images, identifying puzzling aspects of the texts, highlighting passages for analysis, raising questions for discussion), and being respectful of your professor and peers.

Students are expected to turn in all assignments on time. Late assignments will be penalized 1/3 of a letter grade for every twenty-four hours past their due date. Any extensions or make-up work due to an excused absence must be coordinated with the instructor. The provision of any make up exam is solely at the discretion of the instructor.

Assignments and Exams:

Participation will be particularly noted in discussion of articles. Articles will be posted on Canvas and it is expected that students will have come to class well-prepared. Reading the article includes highlighting the argument and key passages, looking up unfamiliar terms and concepts, and having an opinion about the art history methodologies used by the writer.

Research Essay (1000 wc). Due Monday April 22. This will involve research on an African artwork in the collection of the Harn Museum of Art. You will also make a short presentation on your object in class.

Exams: The midterm and the final will require students to memorize works of art and be able to write several sentences about them, as well as essays about artistic developments, in class. Geography and historical awareness, as well as conceptual and aesthetic concerns will be included. Tests will be based on the textbook readings and Powerpoints posted on Canvas that have been discussed in class.

In-Class Recording:

Students are allowed to record video or audio of class lectures. However, the purposes for which these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. To "publish" means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not

limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
