Course Description

This course explores how the work of contemporary artists has interfaced with the genre of science fiction. It covers such themes as theories of the monster and the grotesque; time travel; the Cyberpunk movement; Afrofuturism; and ecocriticism. While holding widespread appeal in popular culture, the genre of science fiction has, over the past few decades, garnered much interest in academic circles. In this class, we will query how examples of contemporary art build upon and/or depart from classic examples of SF film and literature, as well as other cultural phenomena including music videos and video games. Works of contemporary art will be used to unpack dense theoretical ideas about science fiction, and to help us analyze the narrative devices and visual effects associated with the genre. Key questions include: How have ideas about and approaches to science fiction changed over time? How can SF help us to understand and think more critically about the world we inhabit in the present? What can representations of such creatures as aliens and cyborgs reveal about our relations with others (of different genders, ethnicities, ages, etc.)? Can the dystopian landscapes and spectacular utopias in SF help us work toward a better world now?

Objectives

- To identify major forms, actors, and episodes of science fiction across visual media
- To describe examples of contemporary art both formally and historically
- To comprehend different definitions of and approaches to science fiction
- To develop skills of close reading and visual analysis, active listening and engaged discussion

Exams will be take-home in format, and students will have several days to complete a series of short essay responses and creative prompts.

AI Teaching Assignment

In lieu of a final paper, students will create a lesson and teach an AI chatbot about a concise aspect of the visual culture of science fiction. In addition to the transcript of the interaction, students will write a short reflection about the experience. Details will be provided in class.
