This course is part of the core curriculum of Museum Studies. It is designed to prepare emerging museum professionals for a competitive job market while also contributing to our collective understanding and evaluation of cultural heritage systems.

### Course description:

As the museum sector undergoes significant structural challenges, this course engages students in professional development practices and opportunities to network with and learn from local heritage professionals. By the end of the course, you will have fostered a solid foundation of the challenges currently facing the field and be well-equipped to enter the future job market.

Through a mixture of classroom discussions, readings, course assignments, and site visits, we will explore the interdisciplinary nature of the profession and pursue pathways to strengthen preprofessional development. Some key questions will include:

- What are key issues currently shaping the Museum field and am I prepared to encounter them?
- How do I begin career mapping within the GLAM industry and identifying specific skillsets essential to the jobs that I am targeting?

- Are my experiences sufficient for the positions that I am interested in, or are there gaps that I will need to fill?
- How do I build professional connections in the field by networking?
- What tools help me market my skillsets and qualifications to future employers?

Crucially, we will navigate this learning journey together through continuous practices of self-reflection, responsiveness to evolving heritage discourse, and the acquisition of new skillsets. By codesigning a hybrid learning experience, you will tailor your journey to address the most relevant aspects of museum professionalization and your career growth.

#### Course objectives:

This course provides a general overview and introduction to the museum profession. Throughout this course, students will:

- (1) Gain a more sophisticated understanding of the museum field and evolving job market.
- (2) Delve into contemporary issues within the field and explore how they are transforming the profession.
- (3) Engage in professional development initiatives.
- (4) Develop practical skillsets that effectively prepare students for future employment.

There is one assigned textbook for the course:

1) So You Want to Work in a Museum?, 1st Edition. Young, T. Rowen & Littlefield, 2022. (Available Online, UF Libraries)

Additional journal articles, book chapters, and/or newspaper articles may be assigned throughout the semester.

Course evaluation: ARH 6930 is designed to introduce students to the professional side of the museum field to help prepare them for successful employment in galleries, libraries, archives, and other museum and cultural institutions. Course evaluation will reflect this focus and will include a mixture of written assignments, project activities, participation in in-class discussions, and site visits to local GLAM institutions. I will make every effort to offer feedback on all written assignments within two weeks.

- an 'A' denotes work that is exceptional, is represented by thorough and detailed engagement with ideas from course readings and lectures; careful integration of materials or concepts across themes or topics; logical reasoning; sincere reflection; and precise writing.

- a 'C' denotes work that fulfills course requirements in every way, but only adequately.

Classroom Attendance & in-class participation (20%): Your participation grade will be based on the following criteria:

1. This course is a seminar, or discussion-based and attendance is **MANDATORY**. You will be expected to participate fully in classroom discussions. In a seminar course, students do assigned reading and then, under your own guidance and direction—as well as the guidance of the Professor—we will grapple aloud with the ideas we've read, and the places we visit, collectively. Our seminar will be a mixture of discussion, site visits, large and small group activities. Classroom discussions and in-class activities cannot be recreated, so attending class is the only place to engage with material. The course will also require mandatory attendance at local museum and heritage sites. If you miss a class, you are responsible for connecting with a classmate to learn about what you missed, including any assignments or announcements that were made. Any handouts will be made available on the course's elearning page.

Only 1 absence will be excused over the course of the term unless you can provide documentation for a health or family emergency. However, more than two absences may result in failing the course in addition to lowering your overall course grade. Excessive tardiness will also impact final class averages. Attendance is worth 10 percent of your course grade.

- 2. **Participation in class.** Participation includes contributing to in-class discussions by SPEAKING and being intellectually present for each meeting of ARH 6930. Meaningful contributions to class discussion should reflect *your engagement with the assigned reading and in-class conversation*. At site visits, this will include being on time and asking our host institution thoughtful questions. Not participating in classroom discussions will result in a lower course grade. Participation is worth 10 percent of the course grade.
  - 3. **General in-class preparedness.** Students are expected to bring the assigned readings to class and to complete all assigned readings prior to attending class. TV, cell phones, music, and other electronic distractions, are not permitted to be out during class time, as is doing other work while in class.

Requirements for class attendance and make-up exams, assignments, and other work in the course are consistent with university policies. <u>See UF Academic Regulations and Policies for more information regarding the University Attendance Policies.</u>

In general, about written assignments: Because strengthening your professional written skills is an important goal of this course, your grades for these assignments will also emphasize this objective. I encourage utilizing online tools like Grammarly to help improve writing. For your own protection, please make certain that you continuously save your written work as you write and back up those documents on a flash drive or external hard drive. You should also save all graded work until you receive your final grade in the course. In the event that work goes missing or a grade gets miscalculated, this will provide the *only acceptable* evidence that you turned in a particular assignment or received a particular grade.

Policy on late submissions: Unless you have provided substantial, documented evidence for need of an extension, and have discussed the situation with me well in advance of the impending deadline, late assignments will receive a 5% reduction in your grade for each day that exceeds the stated assignment deadline. Extensions will be given only under certain circumstances, and I do not except late work after one week past the original deadline. Malfunctioning computers, printers and so on are not reasonable grounds for an extension. Save your work regularly and in multiple locations and be prepared to print your work in a computer lab if necessary. Please note that I will be the sole judge of what constitutes an extraordinary circumstance, that in most cases my granting of an extension will require that you submit a note from a doctor or other appropriate official, and that extensions must be negotiated in advance. Please also note that sending me an email does not constitute negotiating an extension. Unless we have spoken and agreed on a new date, the original date stands.

The only allowable purposes are (1) for personal educational use, (2) in connection with a complaint to the university, or (3) as evidence in, or in preparation for, a criminal or civil proceeding. All other purposes are prohibited. Specifically, students may not publish recorded lectures without the written consent of the instructor. In ARH 6930, all of the above are prohibited. Any student deemed to have engaged in academic dishonesty will be subject to disciplinary action from the University and will also receive a "no credit" (i.e., a zero) for the assignment.

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<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> A "class lecture" is an educational presentation intended to inform or teach enrolled students about a particular subject, including any instructor-led discussions that form part of the presentation, and deliver by an instructor hired or appointed by the University, or by a guest instructor, as part of a University of Florida course. A class lecture does not include lab sessions, student presentations, clinical presentation such as patient history, academic exercises involving solely student participation, assessments (quizzes, tests, exams), field trips, private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the faculty or guest lecturer during a class session.

Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. To "publish" means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless, of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third-party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
