Course Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate:

- 1. An increased understanding of major developments in tuba/euphonium history and timeline
- 2. An increased understanding of major developments in tuba/euphonium history and repertoire
- 3. A confident and professional style of performing and public speaking

Learning Outcomes

- Develop and understanding of original works, transcriptions, and arrangements for tuba and euphonium in solo and ensemble settings, with a focused lens on discovering BIPOC, LGBTQ+ and female identifying composers.
- 2. Research and learn historical aspects of tuba and euphonium repertoire and be able to apply the knowledge in context of their practice.
- 3. Learn how to take ideas from conception to application and evolution through in-class presentations about specific genres of tuba and euphonium repertoire.

Course Projects and Requirements

Students will explore solo repertoire and prepare and perform band and orchestral excerpts. Additionally, students will research, write about, and perform repertoire for tuba and euphonium. Areas of study will include:

- History of the tuba and euphonium instruments
- Solo repertoire
- Orchestral repertoire
- Solos with band and orchestra
- Quintet repertoire
- Quartet repertoire
- Early jazz repertoire

No. 5	Excerpt or Competition Recording - Professional video/audio recording of 3 excerpts - from the "A" list (Orchestral or Band) - OR record Falcone Competition repertoire
No. 6	Choose 2 band excerpts for euphonium from the A, B, or C list (located in the canvas module) - Discuss the challenges that each excerpt will present for someone just starting to learn the excerpt. - What does the excerpt demonstrate in context of the audition list? - Write one exercise to accompany each excerpt. The exercise should help solve the potential facilitation or technical issue that you have defined.
No. 7	Create an updated wind band literature list containing upcoming composers containing pieces with significant tuba and euphonium excerpts.
