Course Meeting Time and Location: The course begins the first week of classes. Parts are disseminated within a few days. Students are required to begin practicing their scores and individual coaching is available. The full ensemble meets 17 times from approximately September 16 through October 30, 2022. The class time is 7:30 to 10:30 PM or 3.5 hours per rehearsal or performance depending of the running time of the musical. (See Fall 2022 schedule attached.)

Course Description

This course provides an intermediate understanding of specific musical theatre instrumental styles and performance practices from the 1930s to the present. These styles include all forms of musical theatre genres from the classic musicals of George Gershwin and Cole Porter through Rodgers and Hammerstein and Lerner and Loewe, to the rock and contemporary styles of Andrew Lloyd Webber and Lin Manuel Miranda. Each musical will incorporate a variety of these styles and technical requirements. Additionally, the class delivers knowledge of rehearsal and performance techniques and terminology unique to a musical theatre "pit" orchestra. This course is recommended for all musicians who would like to broaden their commercial music theater repertoire and enhance their skills for engagements with professional companies.

Prerequisites:

Audition required or by recommendation of faculty.

Course Objectives/Goals

Musical Theatre Instrumental Ensemble teaches skills essential to competing in the current music theatre industry from performing in a Broadway pit orchestra and touring shows to theme park engagements and cruise line orchestras. The course will provide students with the experience of performing in a variety of venues and spaces, reading charts and creating musical editions unique to a specific production, accompanying singers in a variety of formations both on and off-stage, and working with click-tracks and computer assisted arrangements.

The course develops professional rehearsal standards, etiquette, and the ability to work within a group.

Final Exam: The Musical Theatre Instrumental Ensemble is a performing group. Students will be graded on their final public performance of the assigned repertoire in lieu of a written final exam.
