Course Description

This course is a studio-based introduction to ceramic art and processes. Historical and contemporary examples, aesthetics and 3D design principles will be highlighted through demonstrations, lectures, and tutorials. Students will learn a variety of hand forming processes, glazing and electric kiln firing. Class projects will allow students to practice technique while developing their personal aesthetic within the realm of ceramics. Students are introduced to the fundamentals of working with clay, its respective properties and tools for you to explore and develop a personal language for expressing yourself through material learned. You will be introduced to fundamental techniques for working with clay. Techniques will include hand-building techniques, surface decorations (conventional and nonconventional), Learning ceramic vocabulary and familiarizing oneself with different ceramic artists.

Class time will be used for any combination of the following: Instructor/guest presentations, student presentations, technical demonstrations, research, workdays for larger projects, group dialogue/art appreciation (often called critique) and photographing your work. You will be expected to spend out of time class to do written assignments and additional library/internet research, as well as at least 2-3 hours per week working on your projects.

By the end of this course, you will have a multi-dimensional body of work (objects, images, writings) that will reflect your material explorations and creative research.

Course Objectives:

- To develop a working knowledge of design concepts, including form, structure, space, surface, color, proportion, composition and function.
- To learn the technical skills, vocabulary, processes and materials related to using clay as an art material for creating pottery and sculpture.
- To explore the creation of personal content in art and how that is conveyed to a viewer.
- To increase knowledge of historical and contemporary practices in ceramic art.
- To develop critical skills for analysis and discussion of art works.

Student Expectations

- -Attend all class meetings.
- -Come to class on time, ready to work, with the necessary supplies and completed course work.
- -Be attentive and engaged during demonstrations, discussions, critiques, and meetings.
- -Participate in group discussion and critique in an articulate and meaningful way.
- -Work in a disciplined manner during in class work time.
- -Challenge yourself creatively with each project.
- -Spend necessary studio time outside of class (SEE HOMEWORK BELOW) -Complete assignments on time.
- -Participate in cleanup at the end of class and keep a clean studio outside of class.
- -Participate in all group tasks including clay processing and kiln loading
- -Spend a minimum of 6 hours/week outside of class time working on assignments

Participation

Participation in discussions, group activities, in class work time, and critiques is crucial to the learning process. Through open discussion and participation in group critiques we can talk intellectually and critically about the work. Ceramic processes are a lot of work, your participation as a class in preparation, making, and cleanup are appreciated. Everyone will be expected to help.

Studio cleanup is also a group activity that comes with the territory. Your participation is crucial here, both during and after class.

Professionalism

Once you enter this course you are considered a professional and will be expected to demonstrate professional work habits. This includes meeting deadlines, managing your time and being clear, thorough and thoughtful in your written and oral responses. You will be expected to listen actively, speak thoughtfully and be fully engaged in class. I hope that you will demonstrate your personal commitment to and personal investment in your work by doing lots of making, that you will PUSH beyond what you already know and do, and that you will continue to develop your voice as an artist.

Cell Phones

Cell phones should only be used for pertinent assigned course research. Calls, texting, social media, and watching videos are not allowed during class time. Please silence your devices. Using your phone, tablet, etc. for these distractions will result in an absence for the day.

Sketchbook

Each student will keep a sketchbook in which he/she will plan assignments and sketch ideas. Students will also use their sketchbooks in class to record information and observations during demonstrations and critiques. Sketchbooks will contribute toward your participation grade. An ongoing assignment is to keep a sketchbook for each project. This should include notes from lectures and demonstrations, assigned ideation exercises, in addition to your thoughts, drawings, and reflections for each project. Your sketchbook can be in any format that compliments your practice including fully digital. I will periodically look over your sketchbook but there will be two major submissions (see calendar dates). You will also keep detailed reading notes in the sketchbook.

Homework

Homework in this class should be considered ongoing. I expect you to be putting in the appropriate amount of time outside of class to complete readings, develop ideas in your sketchbook, and complete projects in the studio. We will discuss and walk-through assignments as a class so you will have time to ask questions to avoid misguided efforts. Also, along with each project, artists, readings, and videos will reviewed and posted on Canvas for your reference. Please note that deadlines are NOT negotiable.

Project Expectations

A minimum of 6 hours of studio time per week, outside of class, is required and necessary to complete projects in the allotted time frame. Successful completion of the projects includes preparation (reading, research, sketches, etc.), fulfillment of assignment criteria, presentation of work on assigned date and participating in group critiques. Please complete all readings by the assigned date and be prepared to discuss the material. Finished work must be installed and presented

in a professional manner on the assigned critique day. Installation and any necessary repairs/touch ups must be completed before the start of class.

Grading Policy:

Assessment of Grades-Scale, Point Values

Each assignment must be completed ON TIME for critique in the bisque stage or finished/Glazed.

NOTE: You will be docked 10 points off the assignment for each day it is past due. Critiques will begin promptly at the beginning of class on the due date of each assignment. Your work will be assessed the day of critique as it is.

The Letter grade I give you will be based on:

- Creativity openness to experimentation with clay through process.
- Craftsmanship attention to details, consistency, structural integrity, etc.
- Execution coming to class prepared to work with ALL materials needed for the day, working in studio outside of class at least 4 hours a week.
- Presentation how your work is presented, what input you have to say about your work and/or concepts during critique.
- Effort effort includes, hours of work done outside of class, magnitude of project, and exploration into the project via research and planning.
- Completion of Readings and Written Assignments—familiarity with concepts and ideas and willingness to enter into class discussions.

An 'A' is reserved for students who exhibit a level of intellectual investigation, and exceptional performance within the structure of the class. 'A' students use all their resources, their creativity, curiosity and put energy into their work. They are attentive participants in all aspects of studio practice and discussion. They come to class ON TIME, prepared with their tools, reference materials, sketchbooks and they meet all project deadlines. 'B' students perform at a level of involvement beyond the basic course requirements. 'C' students put forth no more effort than to complete the project at its most basic requirements.

Attendance Policy

Clay

We will use a minimum of 3 bags of clay in this course. Clay is \$25.00 per 25 lb. bag. This clay can be purchased through me during class time or through Derek Reeverts at his office during posted hours outside of our class time only with a CHECK OR MONEY ORDER. There is a form to fill out and bring with you. Once paid, bring the receipt to me or to an available grad student for the clay. The course materials fees cover materials including, slips, wax resist, stains, patinas and pyro metric cones. The plaster, decals and special materials are sold separately and can be purchased with check or money order in the same way you purchase clay.

I will collect receipts during the second-class meeting.

Additional clay will be available during class and can be purchased from me during scheduled hours posted on my office door as well as available grad students. Please arrange to pick up your clay during these hours. It is suggested that you keep any additional clay locked in your locker and that you recycle your used clay for future use (after training).

Not having clay to work with will result in an unexcused absence. We cannot accept IOU's.

Visitor Policy

Your safety is important to us. Keep studios locked and not propped open. Should you have someone wanting to visit, you must seek permission from the Teaching Lab Specialist at least 48 hours before the visit.

Studio Clean-up

To maintain a healthy and efficient work environment, the studio should be kept in clean, ready state for everyone. You are obliged, regardless of how you find studio, to leave it clean. Please set the standard high by leaving your work area clean even if you didn't find it that way. In the case of major problems, please report this to your instructor.

Before leaving, check that the worktables, floors, wheels, stools, surrounding areas, sinks and communal spaces are clean and clear of debris and that your belongings have all been put away. After glazing, wipe tables (and floors), wash and put away all utensils and close all glaze buckets. When unloading kilns clean and wash shelves as they come out of the kiln. They can dry on the counter but go back in the correct bay by the end of the day. Vacuum kilns before and after use and take your ware boards with you after loading. When unloading kilns wash shelves that need it and put them away. Do not leave shelves on the counters. More info on studio practices can be found online in Welcome to UF Ceramics. Remember that this is a group studio, and we all need to pitch in and take responsibility for keeping it a safe and healthy functioning work environment.

Area Rules

All users of the studio classrooms are expected to follow studio area rules at all times. If you have any questions, ask your instructor.

- No eating or drinking in the glaze or mixing areas
- Familiarize yourself with the closest eyewash unit
- Shoes must be worn at all times
- It is required to use safety glasses when grinding, chipping shelves, etc., protective lenses for kiln viewing, gloves for hot objects, heat-resistant aprons for raku, ear protection for grinding and sawing, rubber gloves for mixing hazardous materials.
- Do not block aisles, halls, or doors.
- Do not bring children or pets into the studios.
- Do not store things on the floor.
- Clean up spills immediately.
- Scoop up dry materials, mop up liquids, do not return spilled materials to original source as they are contaminated now
- Carry heavy or large trash to the dumpster
- Place materials containing barium or chrome in the hazardous waste disposal area
- Do not sweep. This puts hazardous materials in the air. Rather, scrape up chunks and wet-clean.
- Report any safety issues IMMEDIATELY to your instructor or the Teaching Lab Specialist.
- All courses must engage in an end of the semester clean up.

• Follow the SA+AH CONTAINER POLICY (see policy below) there are 2 types of labels used in the SA+AH-yellow and white. Both labels are found at the red SDS box and are supplied by the SA+AH. Each is used for a different purpose.

White: All new and or used product in containers (hazardous or what might be perceived as hazardous, i.e., watered down gesso, graphite solutions, satellite containers of solvents, powders, spray paints, fixatives, oils, solvents, etc.) must be labeled within the SA+AH to identify their contents. Labels can be found at the SDS box in each studio and work area. All containers must be marked with your name, contents and date opened. All secondary/satellite containers for hazardous materials must be marked with content, your name and the date opened. Unmarked containers will be disposed of without notice.

Yellow: WHEN HAZARDOUS ITEMS ARE DESIGNATED AS WASTE. All containers must have a yellow label identifying the contents to be designated as trash for EHS pick up. - Flammable solid containers (red flip top) must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside (top). - 5 gallon jugs must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside. - Fibrous containers must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside (top). - Each item in the blue bin must have a yellow hazardous waste label. Note: Hazardous Waste labels should include all constituents in the waste mixture as well as an approximate percentage of the total for that item and must add up to 100%. Labels should also include the building and room number of the shop generating the waste along with the Waste Manager for your area, this is located on the SWMA sign posted at the sink or at the Waste Management Area

Health and Safety

You will be given a Health and Safety orientation at the beginning of the semester by the Teaching Lab Specialist (Derek Reeverts) that will instruct you on all relevant Safety information for the area, labs, and classrooms. Clay Contact Disclaimer:

At times, it can prove helpful to direct your hands with the instructor's hands to learn a method of clay construction or application. Small clay constructions rely heavily on developing a sense of touch with the materials. Instruction will always confirm permission with students when this assist is helpful during tutorials and work sessions. Students may decline, and alternate methods for clay contact can be demonstrated. Students can communicate their preference during the first day of class. Please notify the instructor by the end of the first day of class if this is something that is not acceptable to you.
