Course Description

This online course explores research and evaluation in arts in medicine. Quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods will be discussed, with an emphasis on arts-informed approaches for use in the healthcare settings, be it the hospital or in the community. Given the relevance and usage of qualitative methods in arts research and evaluation, a greater emphasis will be given to qualitative methods, with overviews of arts-based and participatory approaches. Through video lectures, readings, writing assignments, and weekly online discussions, students will learn the basics of developing a research proposal and evaluation plan.

Purpose of Course

The purpose of this course is to provide basic knowledge in evaluation and research with an emphasis on arts informed approaches to enable the student to effectively evaluate programs and to contribute to the growing body of knowledge in the field of arts in medicine.

Course Objectives

Through this course, students will:

- Distinguish between evaluation and research and their purpose and application in the field of arts in health
- Compare and contrast quantitative and qualitative methods and their underlying philosophies
- Demonstrate understanding of a program evaluation process

- Understand key components of a research protocol
- Gain experience in data collection methods and analysis
- Develop ideas for using arts-informed and participatory approaches in arts in medicine research and evaluation

Reading Materials

All required and recommended reading materials will be shared with students on Canvas.

Additional Learning Materials

- Desktop computer or laptop computer for coursework (a tablet or phone will not be adequate for navigating Canvas or completing coursework).
 - Canvas, works most functionally on a laptop or desktop computer. Being a fully online program, it is essential that you have access to one of these in order to view the course and submit assignments. Course Assignments

Please note all assignments and grading rubrics are described in greater detail on Canvas.

1. **Discussions** (8 Discussions, 25 points each): Students will substantively participate in online discussions with their peers and their instructor(s) on the Discussion Board in Canvas. Discussion topics relating to course content will

be posted by the instructor(s). Each student will post an initial post (**due Thursday** by 11:59 pm EST) followed by a response post (**due Monday** by 11:59 pm EST) each week throughout the course. See specific assignment guidelines for each Discussion in Canvas. Be aware that a portion of your Discussion grade depends on your timely participation in both the Thursday and Monday posts.

- 2. **Syllabus Quiz** (25 points): Students will complete orientation guiz on Canvas.
- 3. **Logic Model** (25 points): Students will develop a logic model for an arts in health program of their choice and use it to develop evaluation questions.
- 4. **Survey** (25 points): Students will develop a survey for use in evaluating an arts in health program. Students will test each other's surveys and provide feedback.
- 5. **Interview** (Interview guide 25 points; Interview report 50 points; 75 points total): Students will prepare an interview guide, conduct an interview with an arts in health researcher or evaluator, and write a 750-word report on it.
- 6. **Creative Practice Blog** (50 points): Students will engage in arts-based research methods through their Creative Practice Blog, hosted by <u>Adobe Express</u>.
- 7. **Research Protocol** (100 points): Students will write a research protocol including specific aims/objectives, background and rationale, research design and methods, and anticipated outcomes.

This online course is an asynchronous course which means there is no set meeting time each week; however, there *are* set deadlines for discussions and assignment submissions each week. The course format requires time management and close attention to assignment deadlines. The course is three credits and is 8-weeks long, so it is full and fast-paced. **Students can expect approximately 16 hours of work per week for this course**, which includes reviewing the relevant learning materials and completing assignments.
