This course explores the functions and development of sanctuaries in the Greek world, with particular emphasis on material remains. It looks at the types of places deemed sacred by the Greeks and the activities that took place in them. The major Pan-Hellenic sanctuaries of Olympia, Delphi, and Delos are considered first, with important regional sanctuaries following. Because sanctuaries received major dedications and served as centers for artistic exchange, the course exposes students to some of the most important monuments in the history of Greek art.
