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Course Description

An introductory course for candidates for the Bachelor of Music in Music Education that concentrates on the role and function of music education and music teachers.

Course Objectives

After successfully completing MUE 2040, students will be able to:

- 1. articulate the role of public school music teachers.
- 2. articulate how students learn in terms of brain functioning.
- 3. describe student characteristics in diverse populations common in music classroom contexts.
- 4. identify and describe music teaching methods in terms of historical and current applications in music classrooms.
- 5. write professionally about topics in music education using APA style.

Attendance

For each absence after the first two, a student's final course grade is lowered by five percentage points.

Assignments & Assessments

The final point distribution based on the grading scale below will be posted on the course website at the end of the semester. Any grade discrepancy should be brought to the instructor's attention immediately. Keep all original copies of assignments and grading documentation, hardcopy or electronic copies as distributed to students.

It is each student's responsibility to submit assignments on time, check grades online, and monitor his/her course grade throughout the semester.

As music education majors, students will be video recorded on many occasions most commonly when peer teaching. Video files are for used for classroom assessment, which qualifies as a public record according to Florida law.

Written assignments must be word-processed and use good writing style, correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation. Papers should use 1-inch margins, double spacing, and 12pt Times Roman font. APA style is required for all essays.

APA Format

For formal writing in your music education courses, use the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, 6th edition.* Listed below are some basic items from the format. Please consult the text for full explanations on these and other topics. See the web link on Blackboard for more information.

Basic Items:

- One-inch margins
- Times Roman Font 12pt
- Double spaced without extra spacing between paragraphs
- Cover page (document title, your name, SU, course title, date)
- In-text citations and a reference list, all formatted correctly

Exceptions to APA format:

- Unless you are planning to submit the document for publication, *you do not need a running head* on the cover page.
- You do not need an abstract.
