OBJECTIVES:

The purpose of this course is to intensively prepare music education majors for teaching at the secondary level, i.e., middle school and high school. Pre-professionals in this course should have successfully completed the *Introduction to Music Education* (MUE 2040), *Elementary Music Methods* (MUE 3330) courses and *Beginning Conducting* (MUG 4104). (If you have not completed these three courses, you must inform the instructor immediately.) This course will emphasize the theoretical and practical techniques of teaching this particular age group in **today's** world and will prepare future teachers to motivate and maximize the musicianship of students in the public school context.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES TO MEET THE OBJECTIVES:

Students will exhibit that the objectives have been met through the following learning activities:

- 1. Tests over the major tenets of the text, i.e., reasons for teaching music, the curriculum, the profession, performing groups, standards, technology, discipline, assessment. Students will be responsible for textbook facts, as class time is too valuable to spend "re-reading" the information in the text. Discussion will be limited to the synthesis of the material.
- 2. Micro-teaching in the classroom. Prior to intensive filed experience, students will teach their peers. These micro-teaching lessons will include detailed lesson plans to show the sequence of instruction, and the actual teaching style of the lesson. These lessons will incorporate the MENC National Standards and the Florida Sunshine State Standards.
- 3. Field Experience: Students will be in "reality based" field experiences where each time they are on-site, they will actually teach in secondary classroom situations. These field experiences will be evaluated by the teacher on-site and the university professor.
- 4. Video Tapes MPEG: Students will video tape (digitally video record) their field experiences (not the day the university professor comes to visit!!) and have one fifteen to twenty minute video of their teaching to present to the class at the conclusion of their field experience. A detailed lesson plan (one

- for each member of the class) and self-evaluation should be provided to the instructors on the day of the video tape presentation.
- 5. Field Experience Notebook: This should include but not be limited to: a daily log of your teaching, daily lesson plans, other information about the school, workshops, discipline, programs, etc. This will be graded on neatness and organization of presentation as well as content.
- 6. All students are required to be active members of UF CNAfME and attend all meetings. Attendance will be taken and the attendance/absence policy will apply to all meetings.
- 7. Other activities, discussions, and assignments as deemed by the instructor to assure that the objectives are met.
