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Third Annual Florida Contemporary Music Festival Brings Performers, Composers to the UF School of Music February 19-22

Gainesville, Fla., January 28, 2015 — The University of Florida (UF) School of Music, UF Student Chapter of the Society of Composers Inc. (SCI) and the UF Student Sonic Computing Organization (SCO) will present the **third annual Florida Contemporary Music Festival** at the UF School of Music in Gainesville, Florida, Feb. 19-22, 2015. The festival, which celebrates and explores new and adventurous contemporary compositions, will feature lectures, master classes and avant-garde performances in an assortment of mediums and styles, ranging from traditional to experimental eclectic. The event, which is sponsored in part by UF's Student Government, will feature guest artists and conductors and is free and open to the public.

The Florida Contemporary Music Festival began in the spring of 2013 as a multi-day event designed to bring together the performing and academic resources of the School of Music in an exploration and celebration of adventurous, novel and exciting contemporary compositions. Each year, guest composers and performers share their talents and ideas with the UF community, and faculty and student performers and composers present a wide variety of compositional styles employing cutting-edge technology.

This year's guest performers, **The Bugallo-Williams Piano Duo**, have been hailed for their groundbreaking style and technique. Featured guest composers **Daniel Kellogg** and **Katharina Rosenberger** have each performed at festivals around the world and have received prestigious awards for their revolutionary and innovative work. Kellogg and Rosenberger will conduct master classes with UF composition students and conduct lectures to discuss their creative works.

"One thing that distinguishes the UF School of Music from most programs around the country is the heavy emphasis placed on the composition and performance of music of our own time," said event coordinator and UF Professor of Composition Paul Richards. "Part of the mission of a music school within a research university is to embrace and encourage new ways of creating and performing music, and this festival serves as a focal point for these activities every year."
